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House Rejects Poverty-Area Group Assails Antipoverty, to Fight Rats Rights Appointments

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The House Thursday rejected the anti-poverty program for fighting rats in city slums and, promptly, found the \$130,000-a-year program of caring more for animals than for children.

The House, on a 201-178 vote, refused to take up the \$40 million program of federal grants to state and local programs aimed at getting rid of rats.

LEADING the opposition were anti-rat Republicans, some of whom argued that the rat problem is a city health problem and should be handled by city health departments.

TARGET AREAS are the north, south and east regions of Minneapolis in which most anti-poverty programs are aimed.

One telegram, sent to the Chicago regional office of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, urged the program will not be examined by the House.
